



### FICTION


#### *The Engagements* by J. Courtney Sullivan



#### *Murder in Time* by Julie McElwain


#### *Last Bus to Wisdom* by Ivan Doig


#### *Homegoing* by Yaa Gyasi




### NON-FICTION

#### *Born a Crime* by Trevor Noah



The true story of a man who lived alone in a tent in the Maine woods, never talking to another person and surviving by stealing supplies from nearby cabins for twenty-seven years.




**Time You Let Me In by Naomi Shihab Nye**






**Matilda by Roald Dahl**


**Nimona by Noelle Stevenson**
