Our well-equipped labs furnished us with all we needed in order to explore any field of science in which we were most interested. We were taught the basic principles of each science and were encouraged to do research on our own. Every two years this department has sponsored a Science Fair. Here the experimental and creative efforts of interested students were displayed.

Through varied field trips, laboratory work in biology, and experiments in physics and chemistry, we gained a first-hand knowledge of each subject.

The attractive and informative displays in the showcases were another of the accomplishments of this active department.

Mathematics

The Mathematics Department under the inspiring direction of Miss Dunning gave us a comprehensive training in mathematics. This four-year course, which is especially valuable to the college preparatory students, progressed from elementary algebra to the highest mathematics which is studied in high school.

A math team made up of the more advanced students participated annually in the contests sponsored by the North Bergen Mathematics League as well as by other organizations. A club for those who are especially interested in mathematics has also been developed by this department.

Will

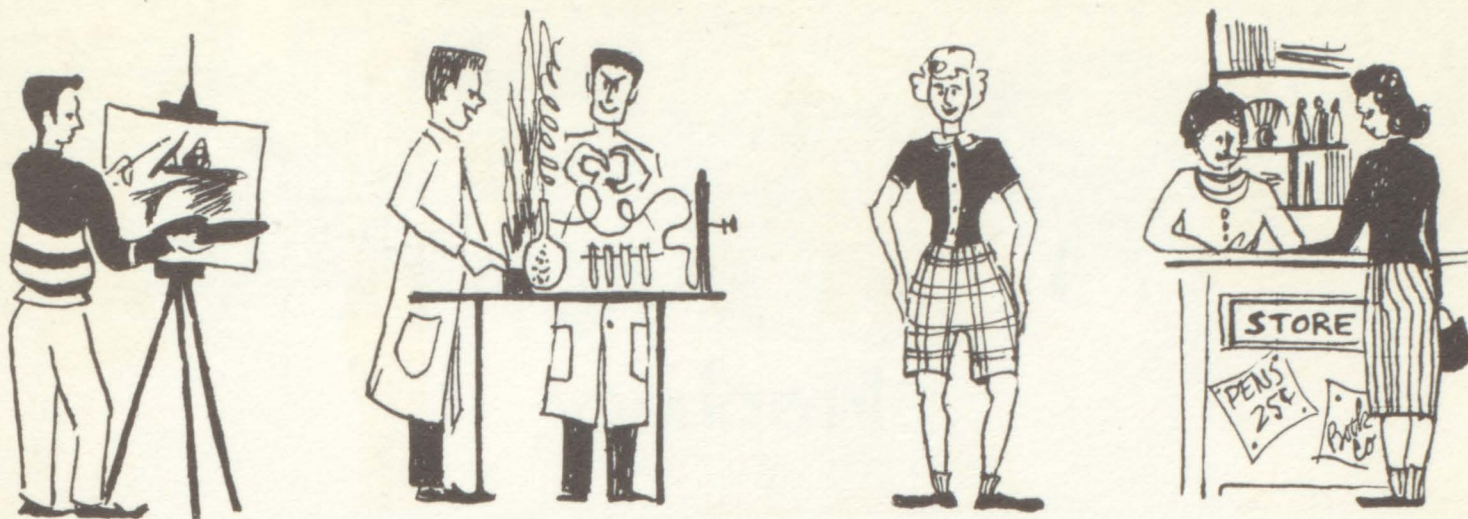

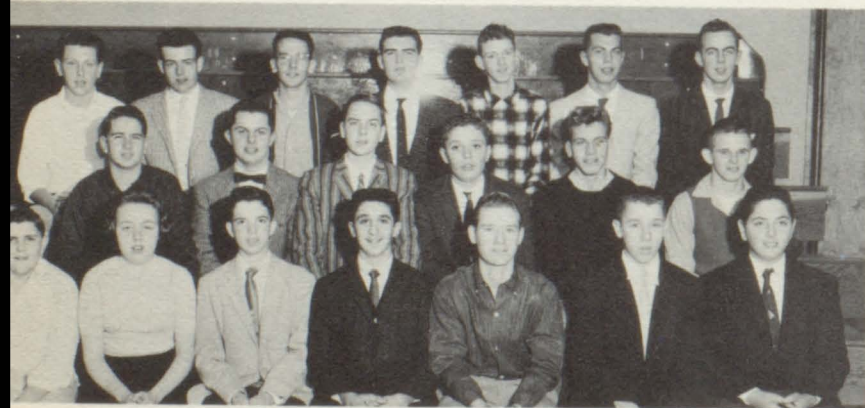

Basketball

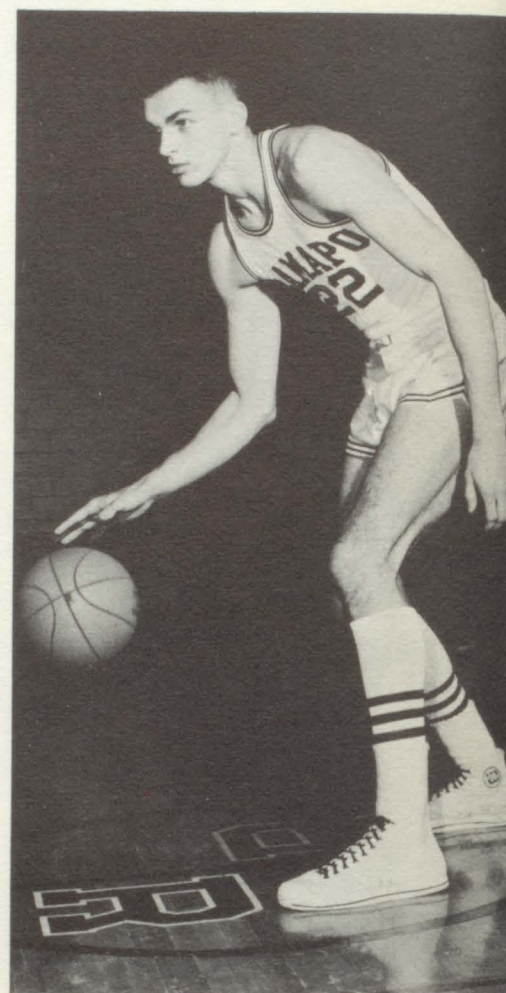

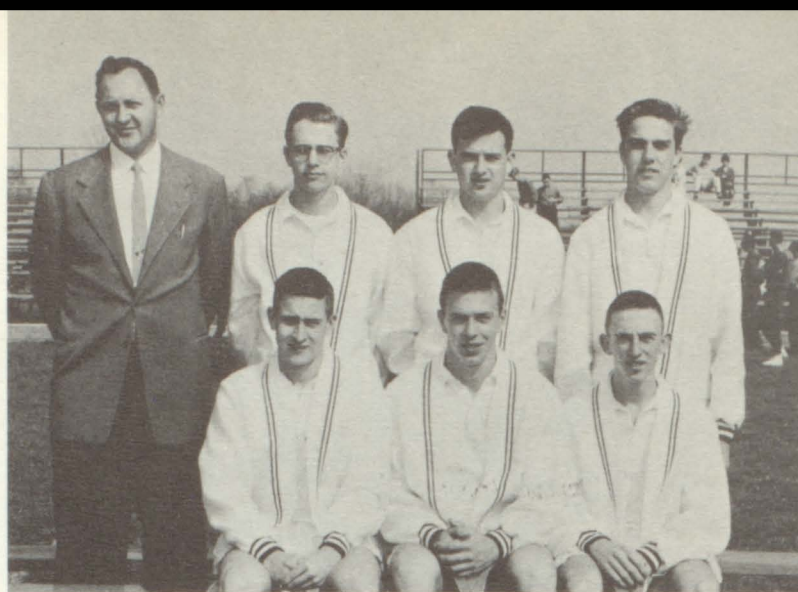
