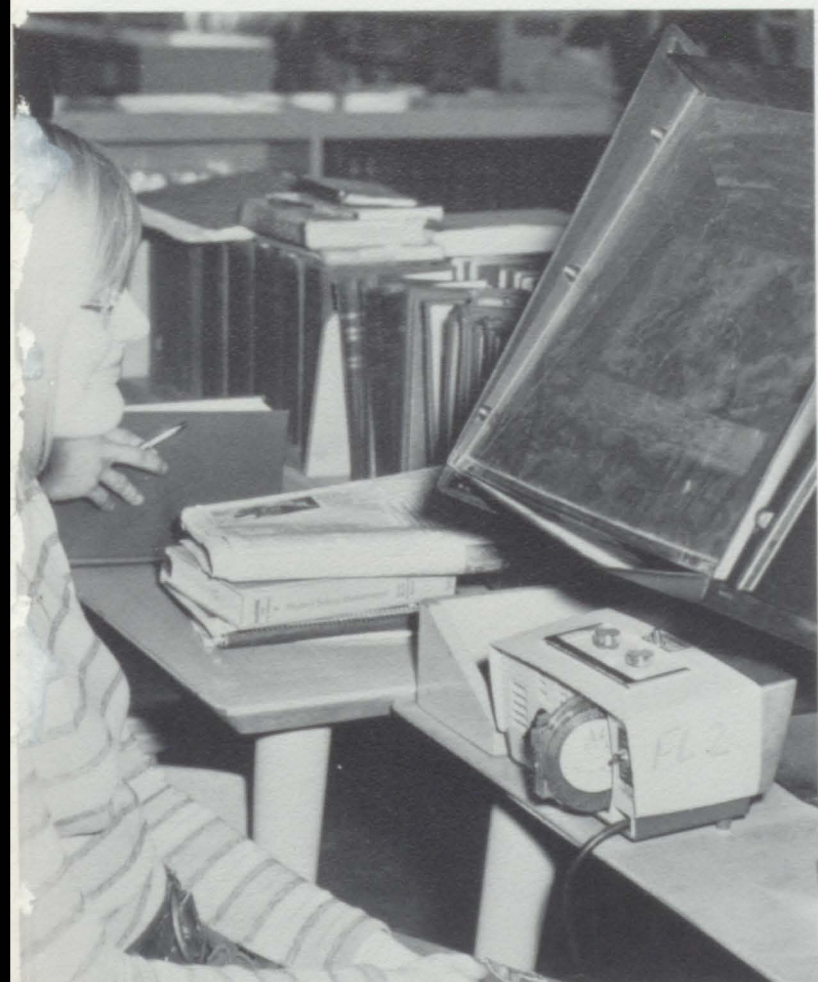

This year the Social Studies Department is placing greater stress on providing opportunity for democratic living in the classroom, where the principles and ideals of American democracy may be practiced by students and teachers alike. Thus, this year's representatives of the Student Council for juniors and seniors were chosen from the U.S. history classes. Informative discussions followed in the reporting sessions.

The area of the behavioral sciences available for student probing has been expanded. Besides permitting juniors to elect sociology, the Department has initiated a course in psychology for seniors.

A different perspective has been provided in many of the classes, wherever possible and feasible, by having teachers exchange classes at mid-year. Teachers and students found this refreshing and stimulating.

New approaches have been developed and new materials are being used in several of the courses in an effort to increase students' interest through subject relevance for living today.

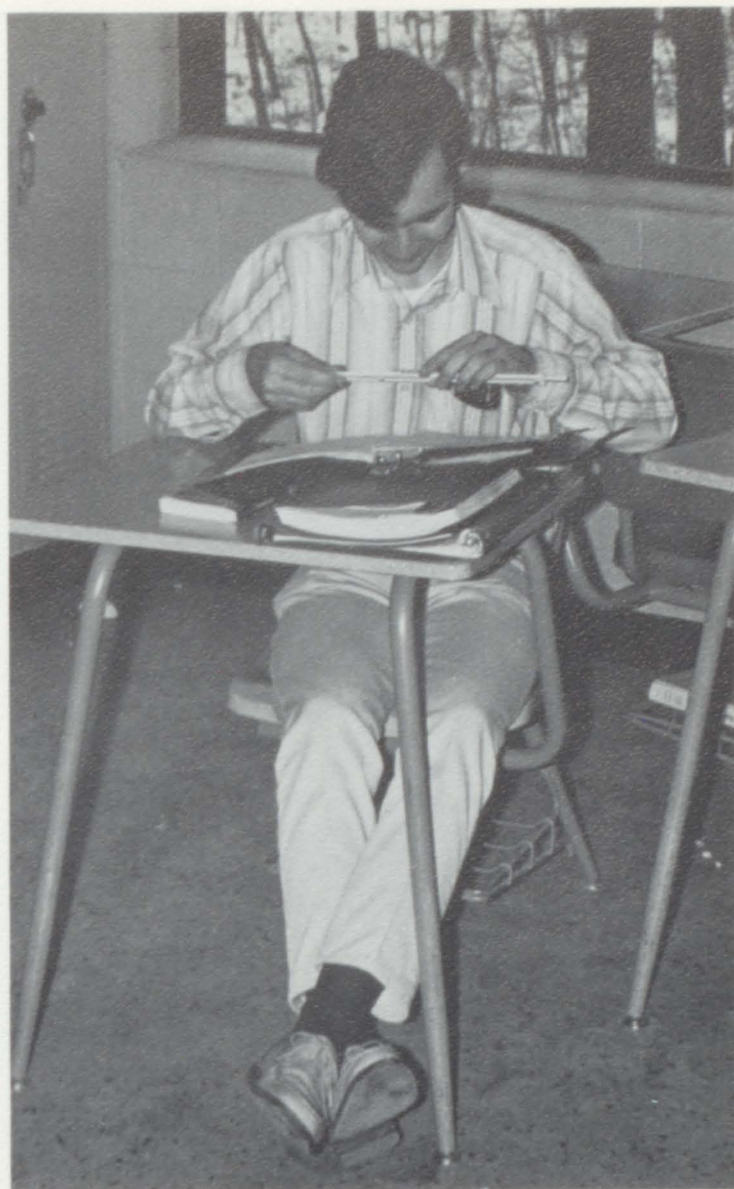

Computer rules Math Department with calculating logic

Mathematics, a fundamental academic subject, is essential to the development of all students. The need for a knowledge of mathematics is recognized by the Department at Ramapo and is evidenced by courses offered within the mathematics program. Courses include general mathematics, geometry, Algebra I and II, calculus, senior mathematics, and selected topics of students' choices.

Mathematics is an ever-changing study; new formulas and methods are constantly being developed to replace the old ones. The Department, in an effort to keep up with the changes in mathematics, incorporates the use of the computer in the Senior Mathematics and Selected Topics programs. In an attempt to develop the mathematical awareness of the student, the Department presents both the basis of general mathematical studies and the advances made as technology progresses and knowledge increases.

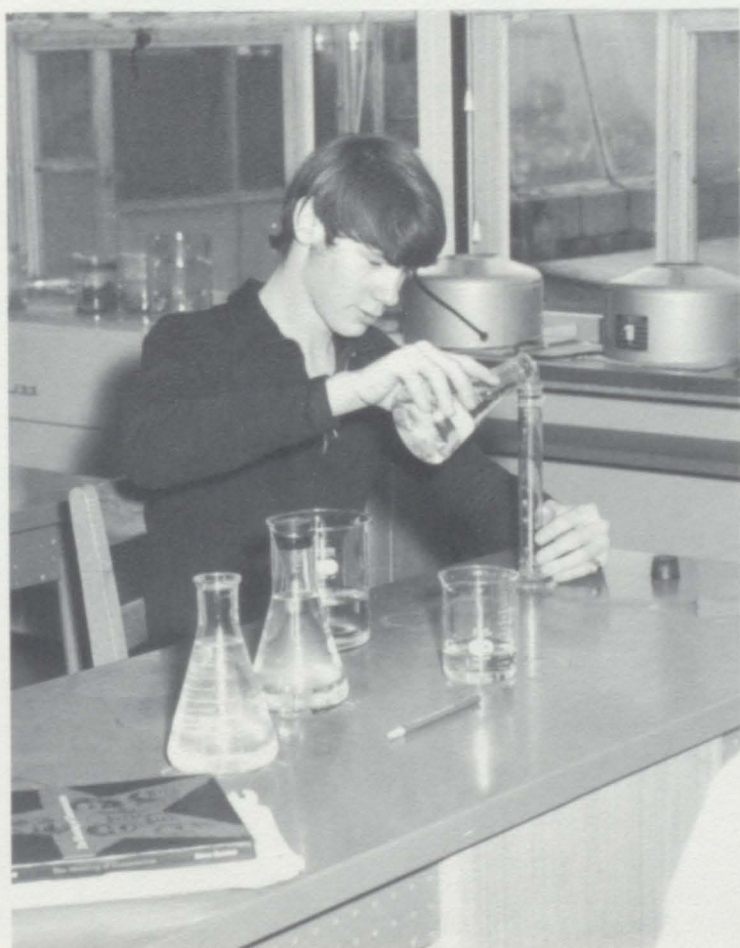

Included in the program are: freshman-level general science (which investigates such areas as meteorology, electricity, and mechanics) as well as biology, chemistry, and physics.

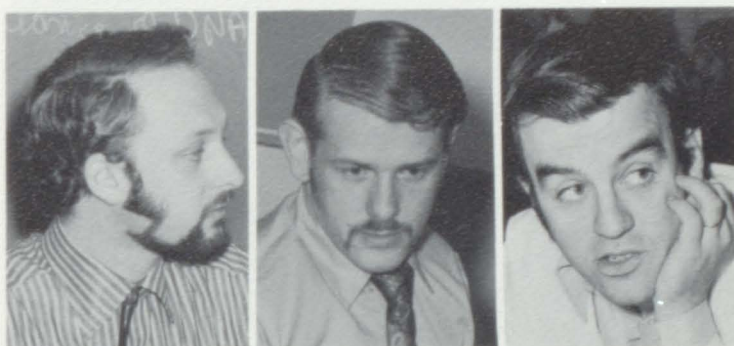

The Foreign Language Department at Ramapo encompasses a diversified curriculum. It acquaints the students with not only the language basis, but with the culture, history and geography of the nations in which the language is spoken. Ramapo's Foreign Language Department offers studies of four major foreign languages — French, German, Spanish, and Latin. Students actively put their knowledge of the language to work with the aid of contemporary textbooks, language labs, musical recordings, literature, films, slides, maps, skits, discussions, and field trips. The language students become familiar with the mechanics of usage and vocabulary and explore the classics, folk-lore, and current events of each country as well. Through the use of all these devices, the students of Ramapo acquire an extensive understanding of the languages and cultures they are studying.



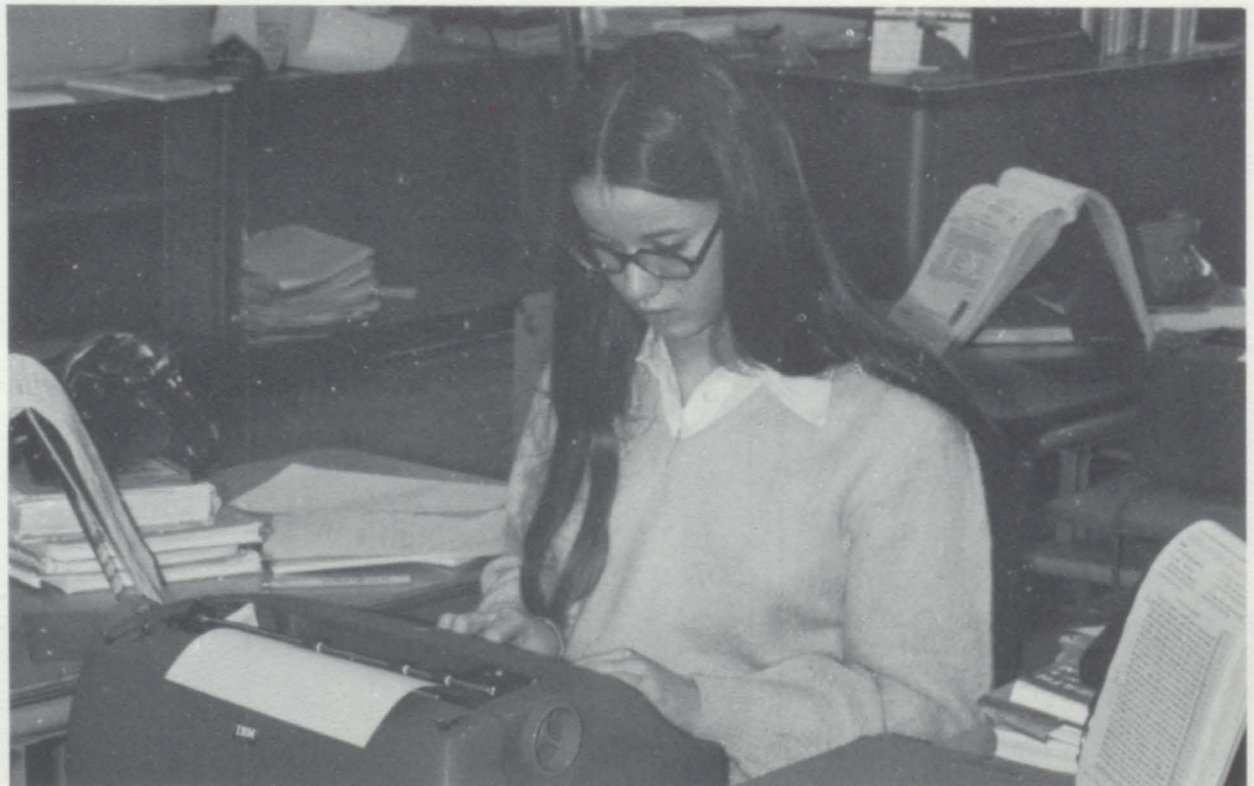

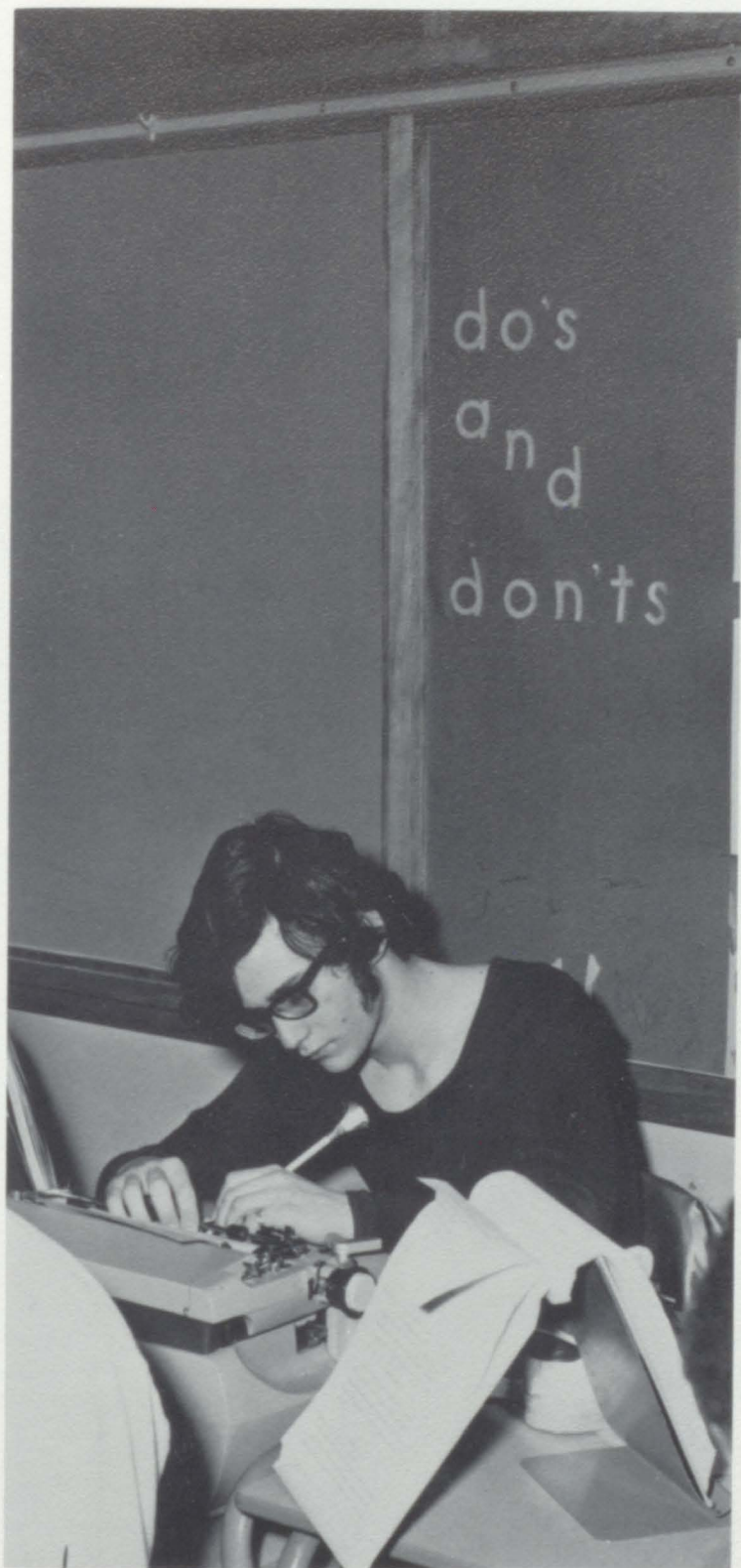

Getting the business from school

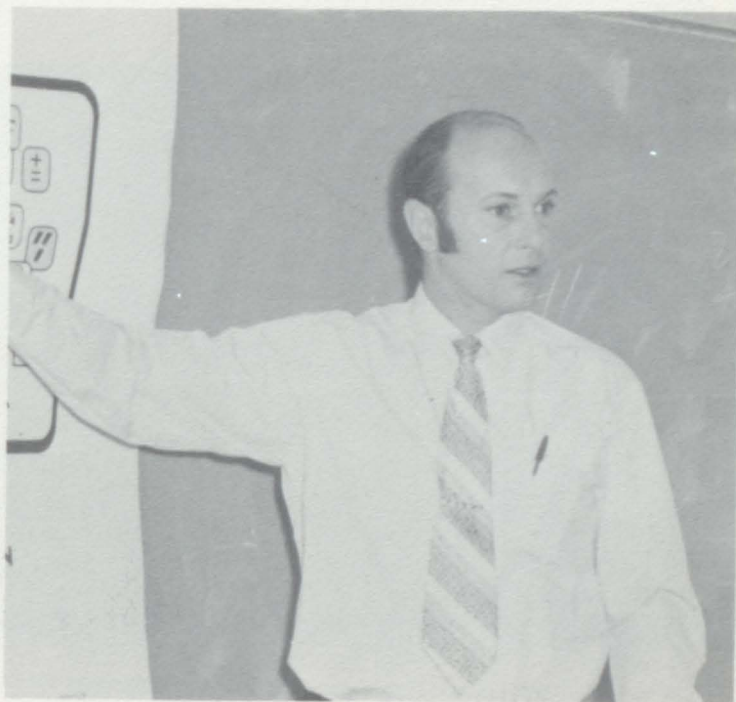

A varied business program is offered for those students who wish to attain a comprehensive knowledge of business practice and management. Students can take such courses as bookkeeping, typing, shorthand, and business art to help them prepare for a career. The student who has an interest in business but is taking a college-preparatory program is offered a course involving the principles of business. Another offering developing a skill which can be utilized by all is the Personal Typing course.

In order to gain experience in business as well as to learn the basics, students may take part in the Distributive Education program which gives them on-the-job training. Participants in this program have their class schedules arranged to divide their time between work and school. Secretarial Practice and Clerical Office Practice are also available within the business program. In accordance with this program, students taking secretarial courses can put their recently acquired skills into practice through work with teachers in the school who need their services.

With the opportunities to study and practice business techniques, students at Ramapo are prepared for the business world ahead of them. Ramapo prepares the student for whatever he may choose to do in life whether he be college-bound or office-bound.

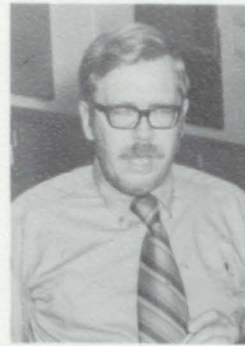

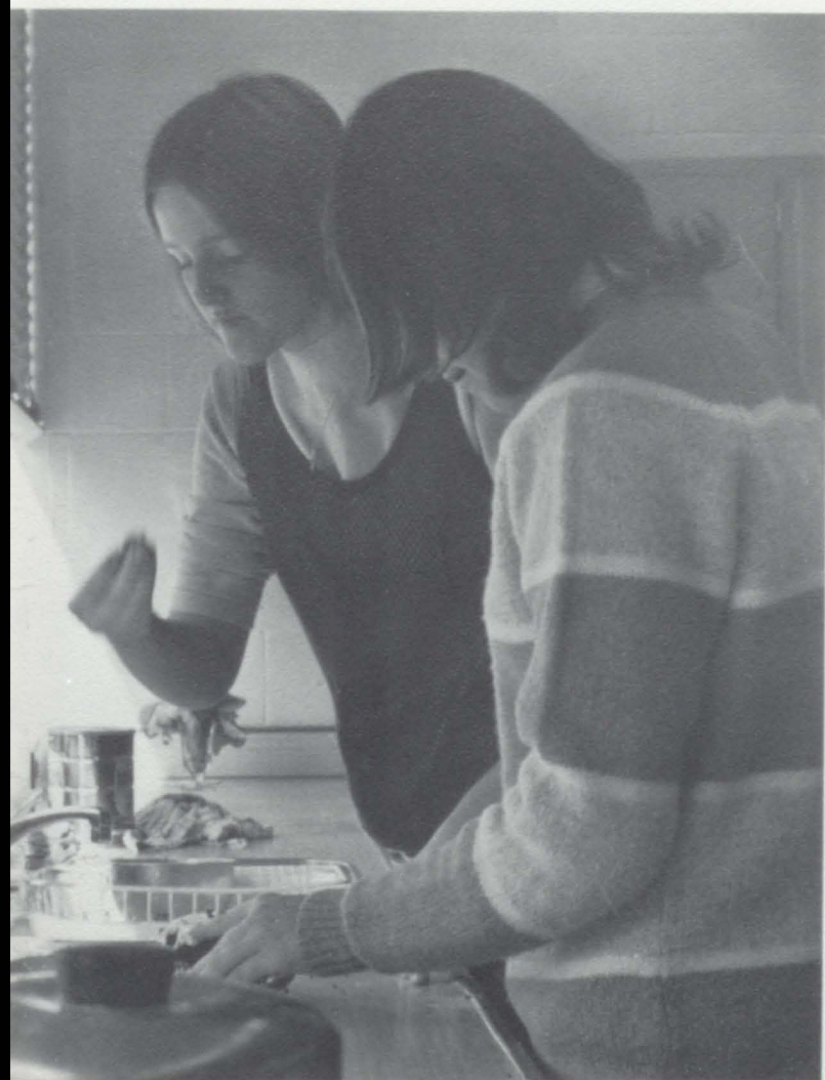

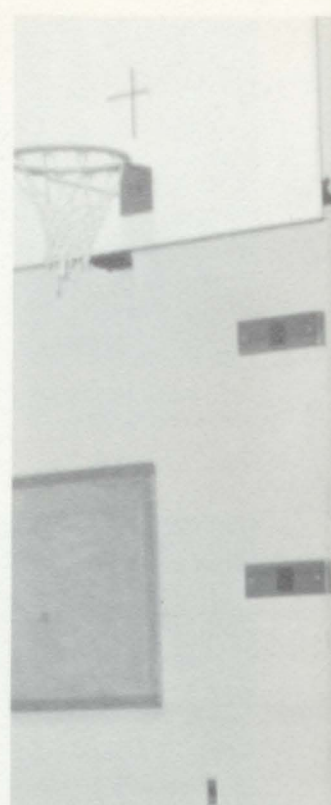

Special Education Department is geared towards individual development

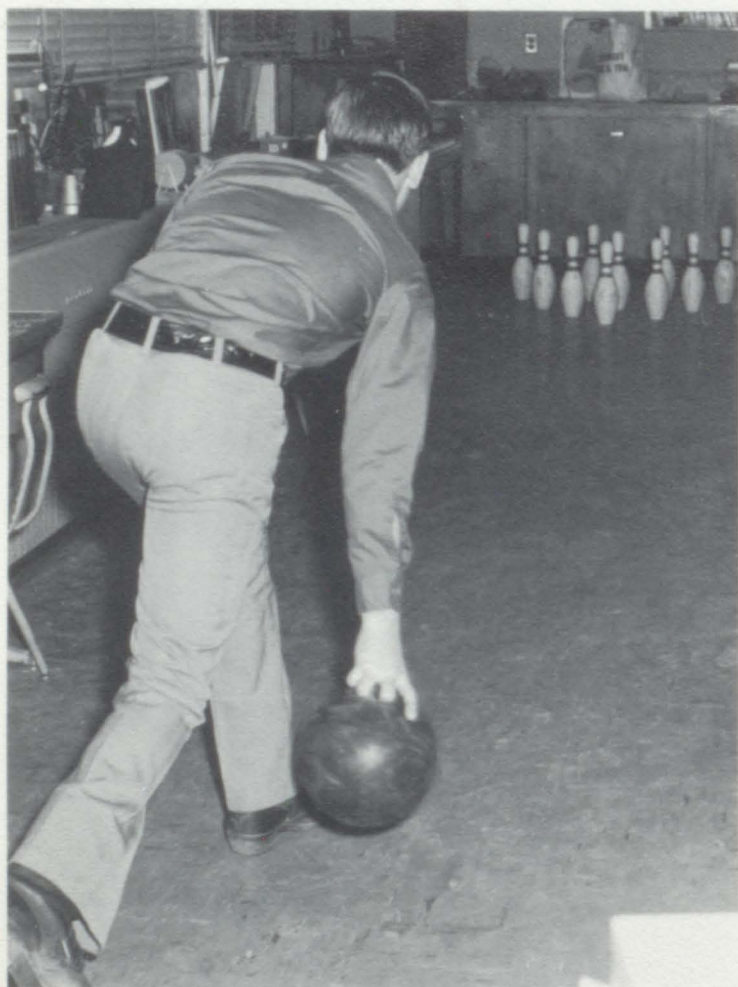

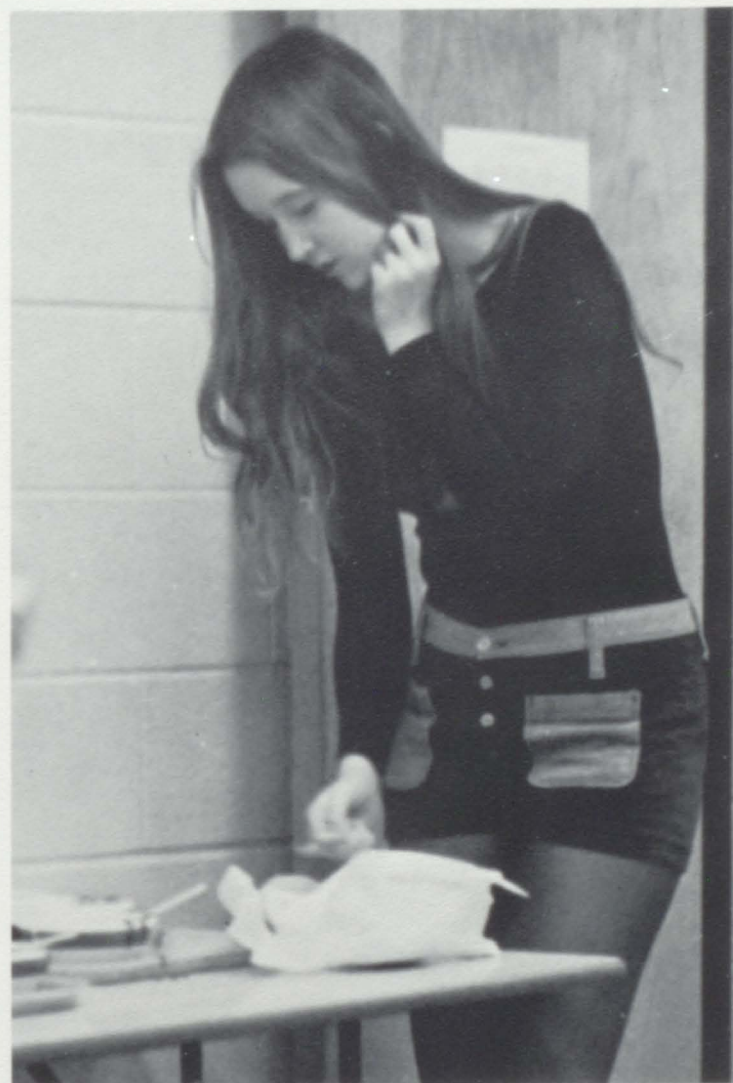

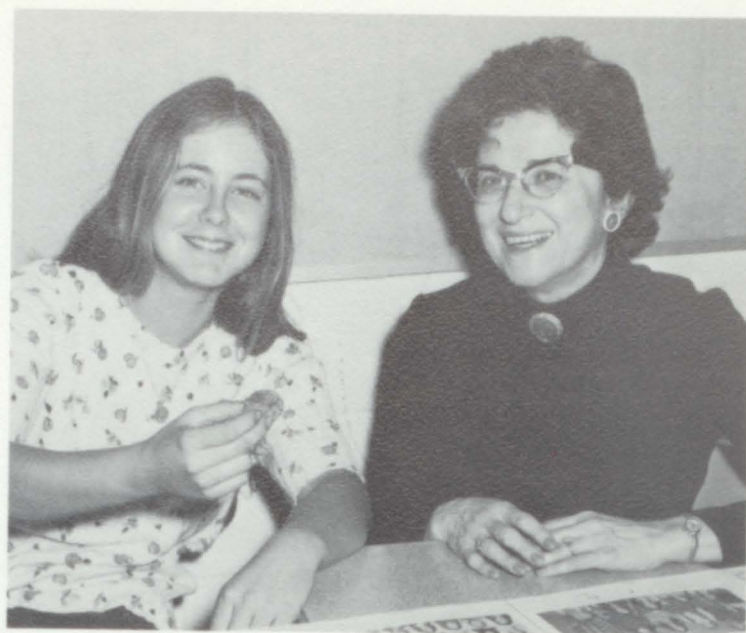

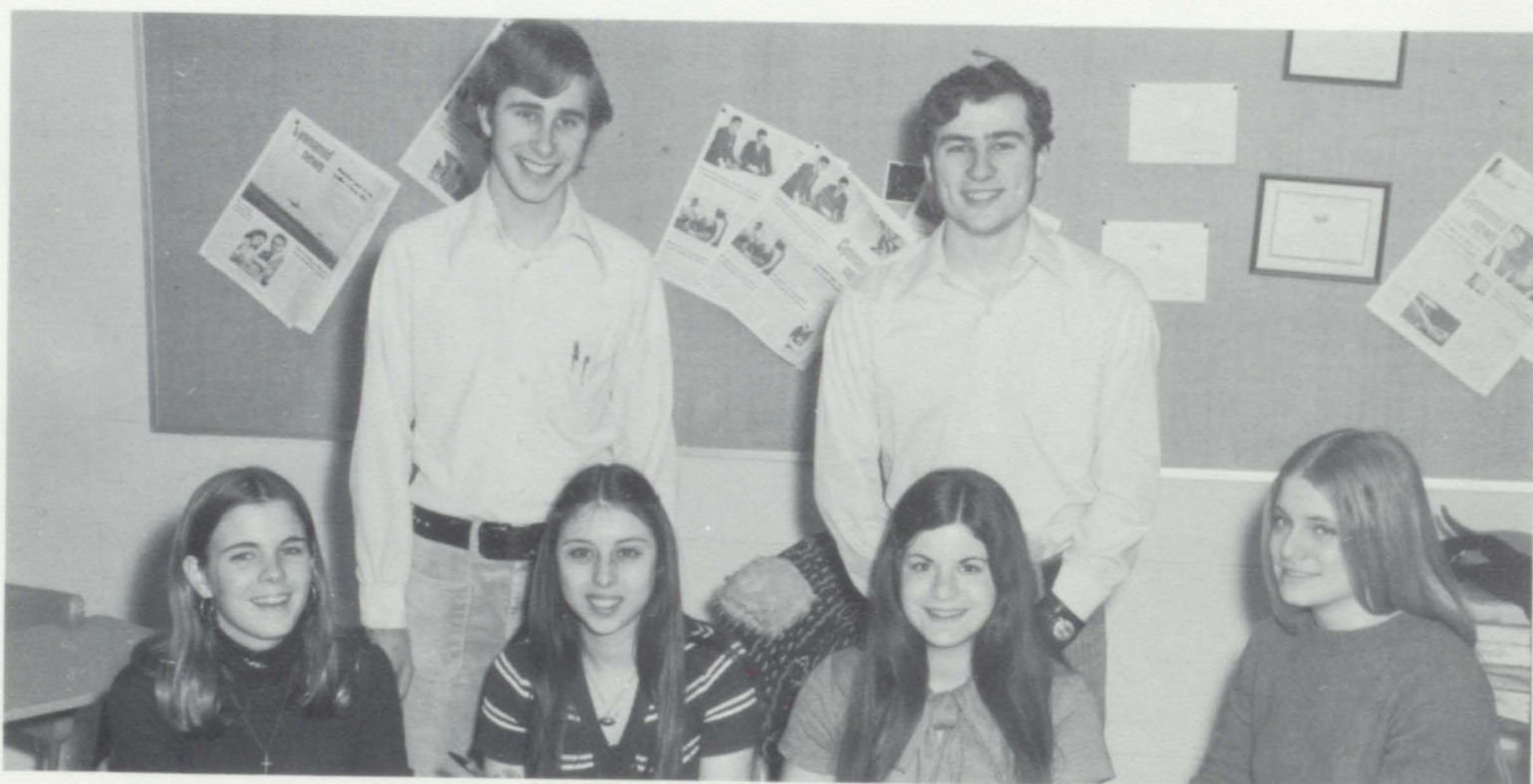


Ad Astra captures Ramapo today for recollection tomorrow

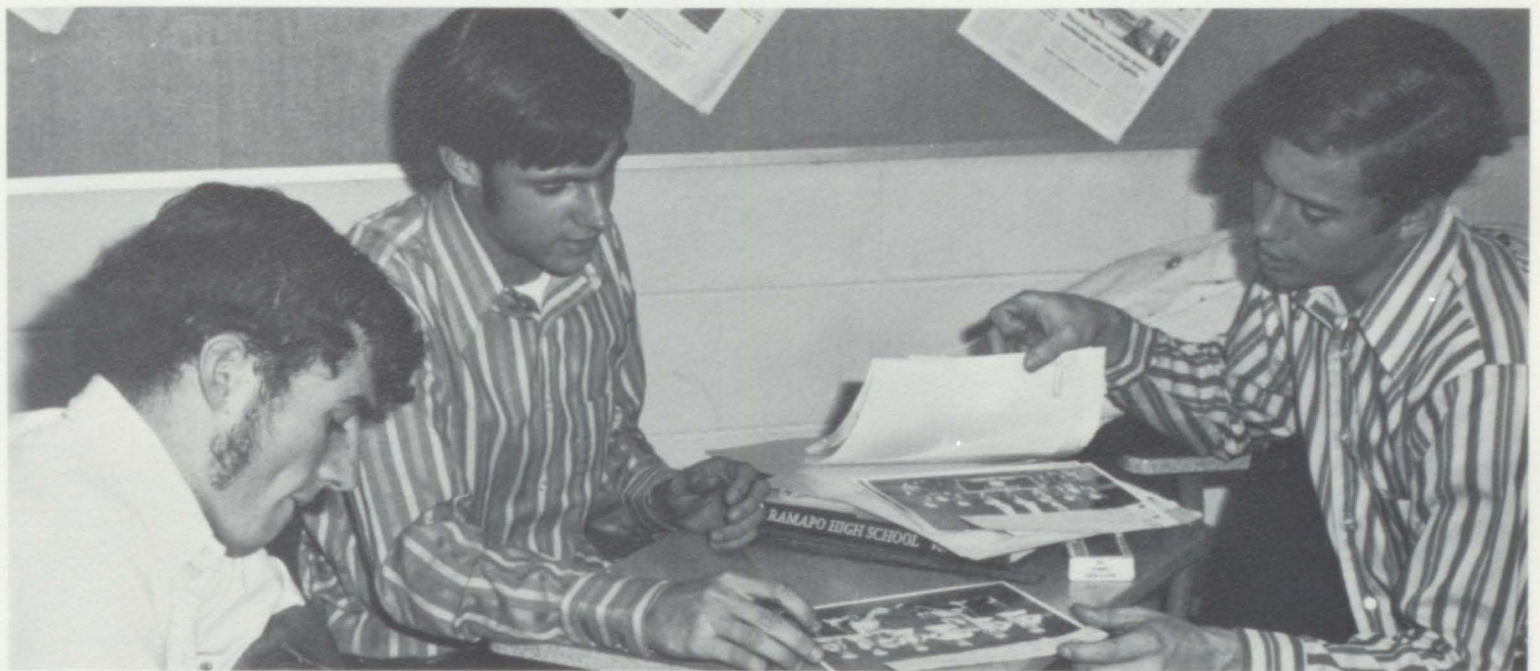

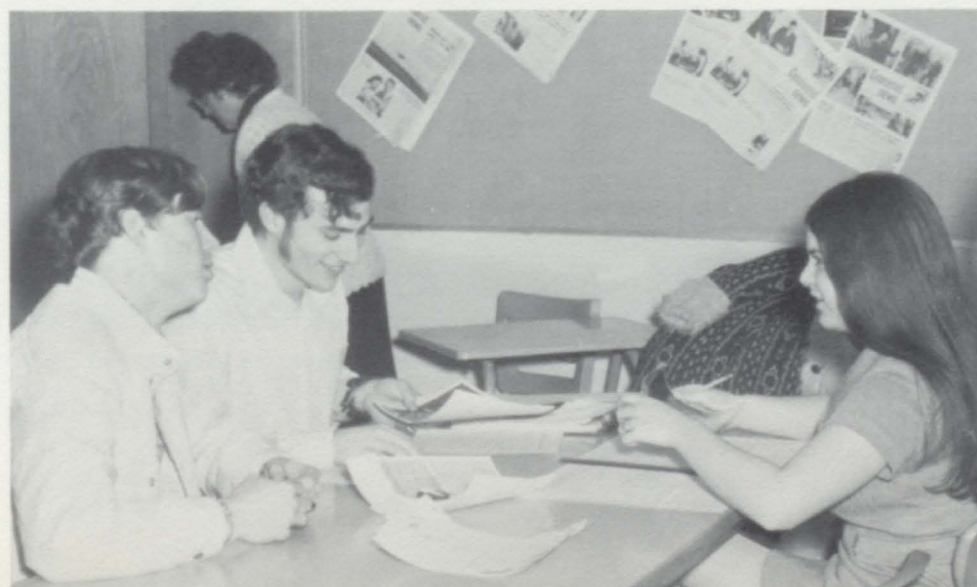

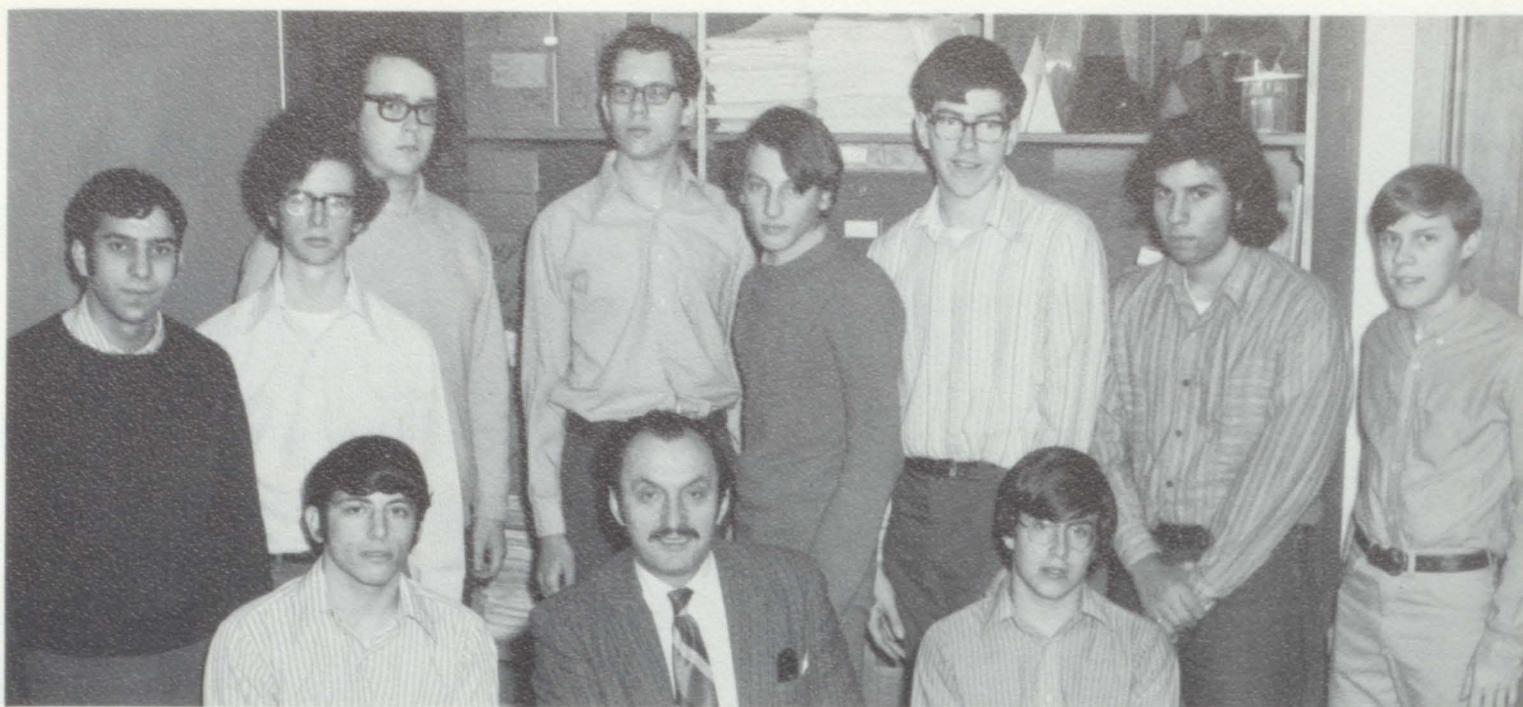

AUDIO VISUAL AIDS

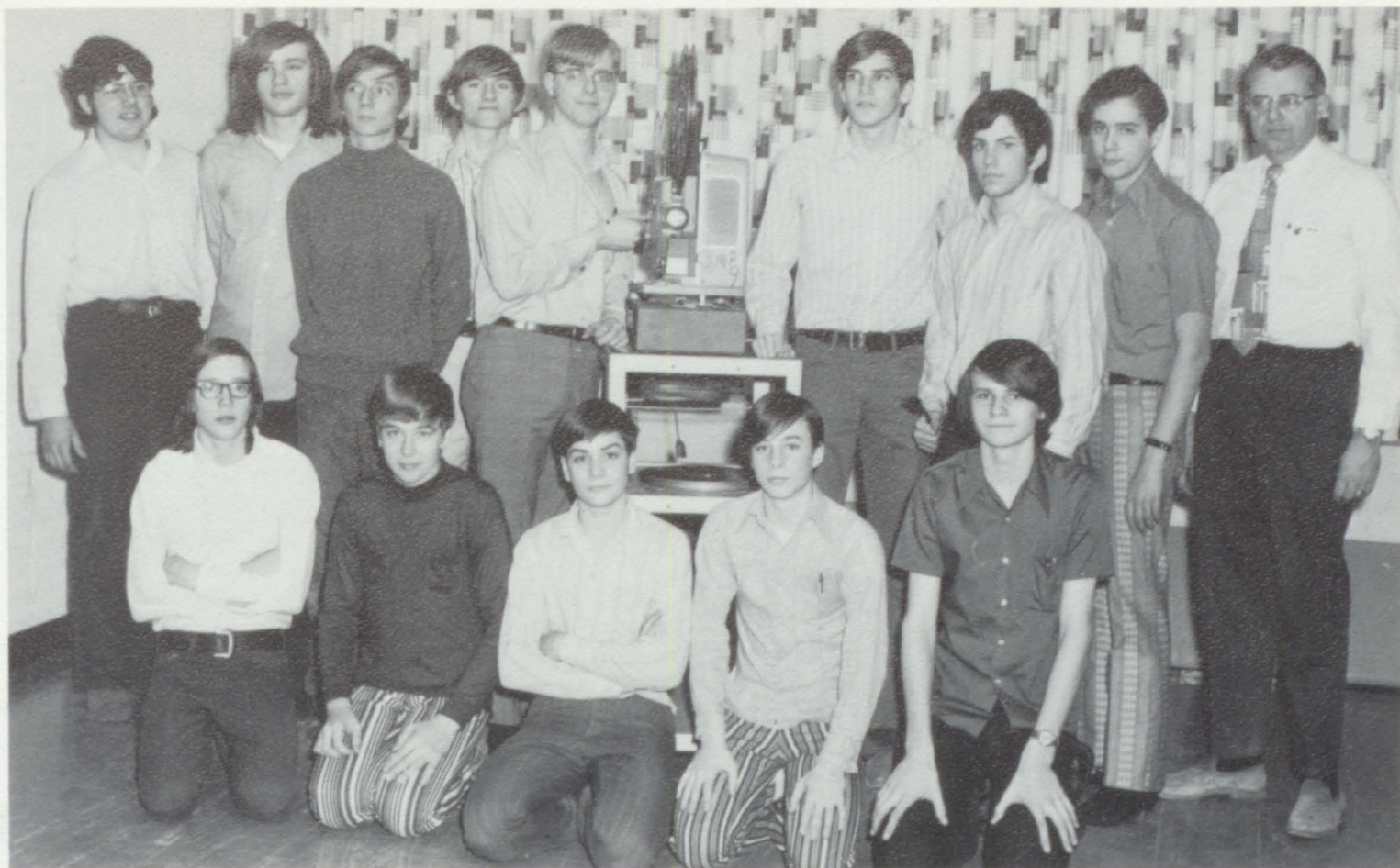

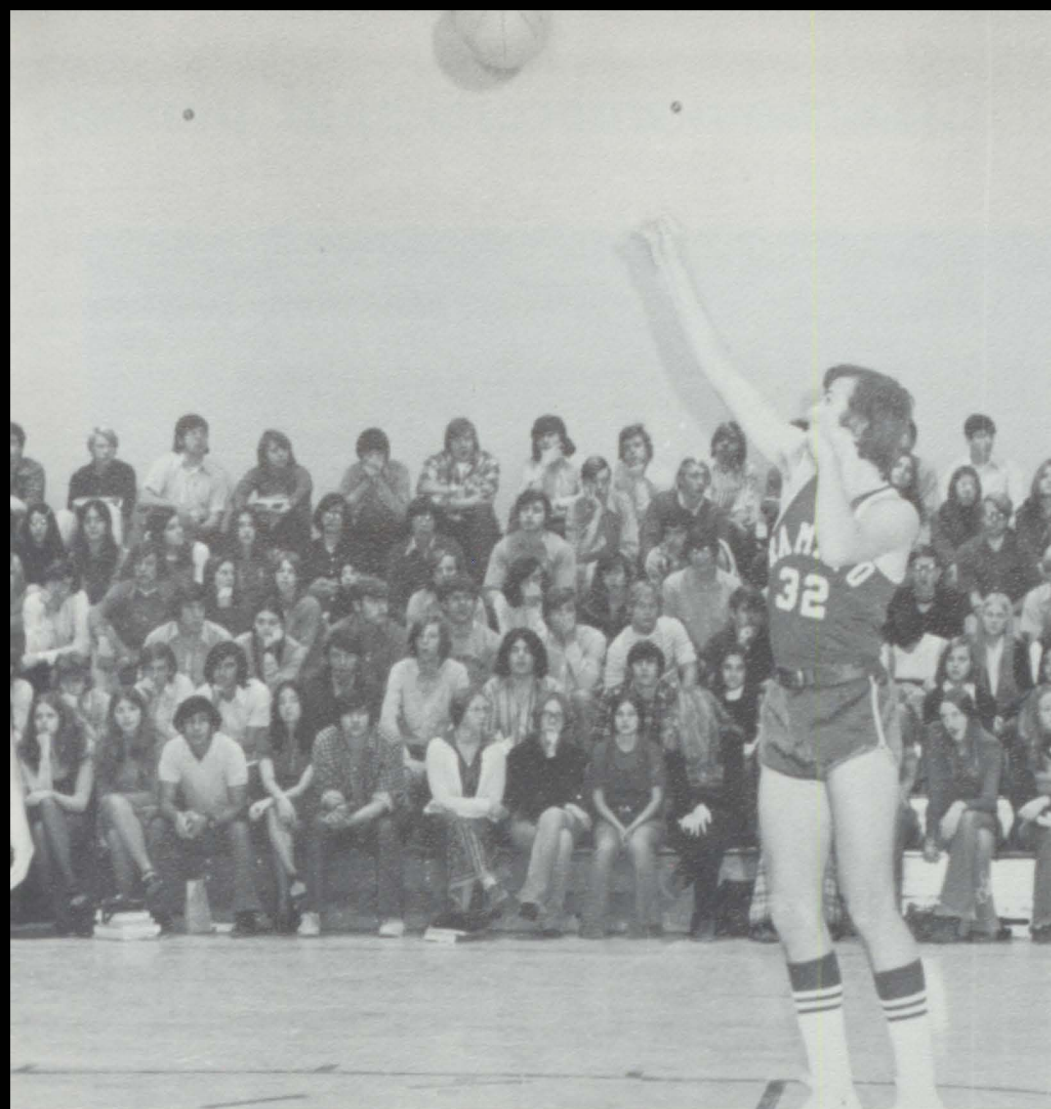

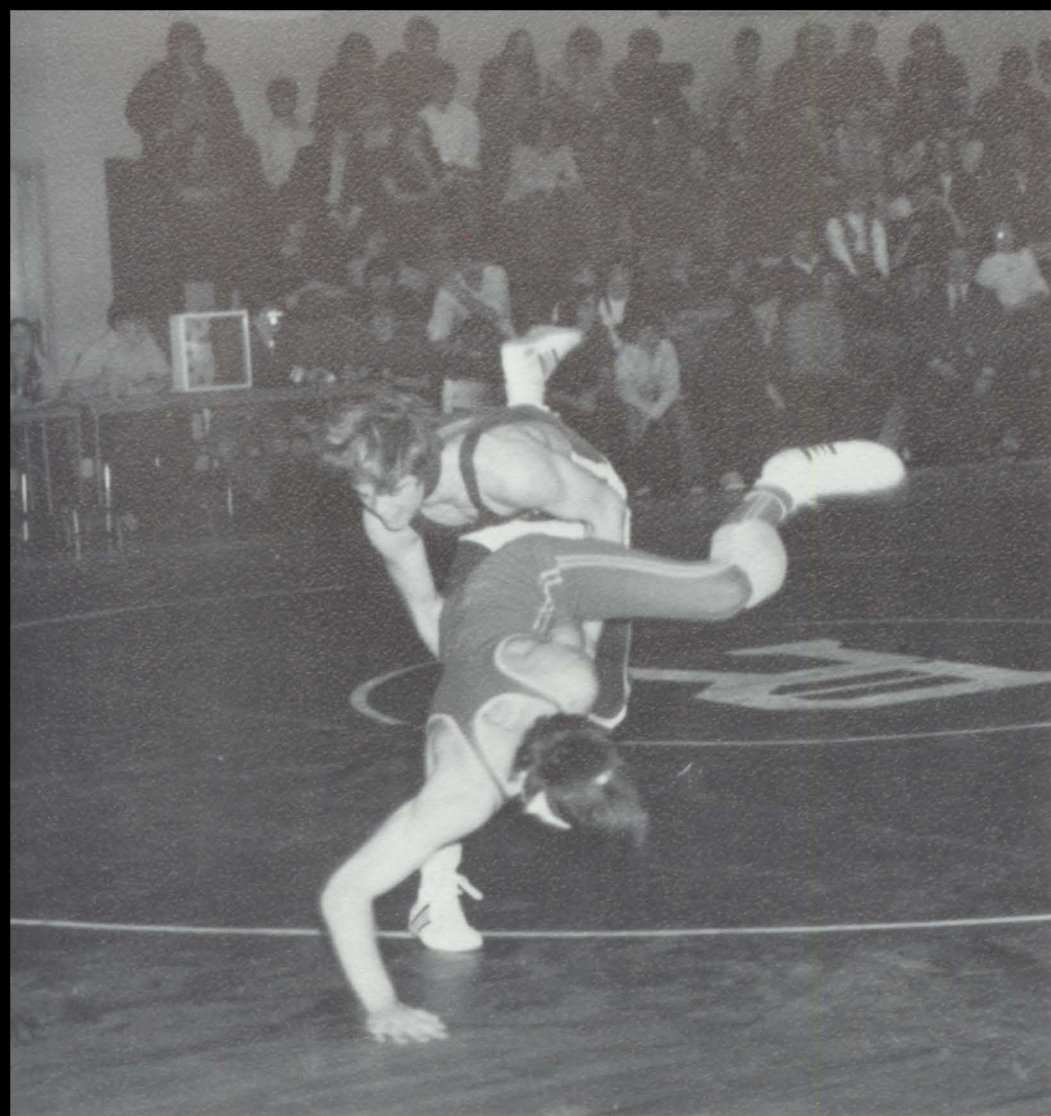

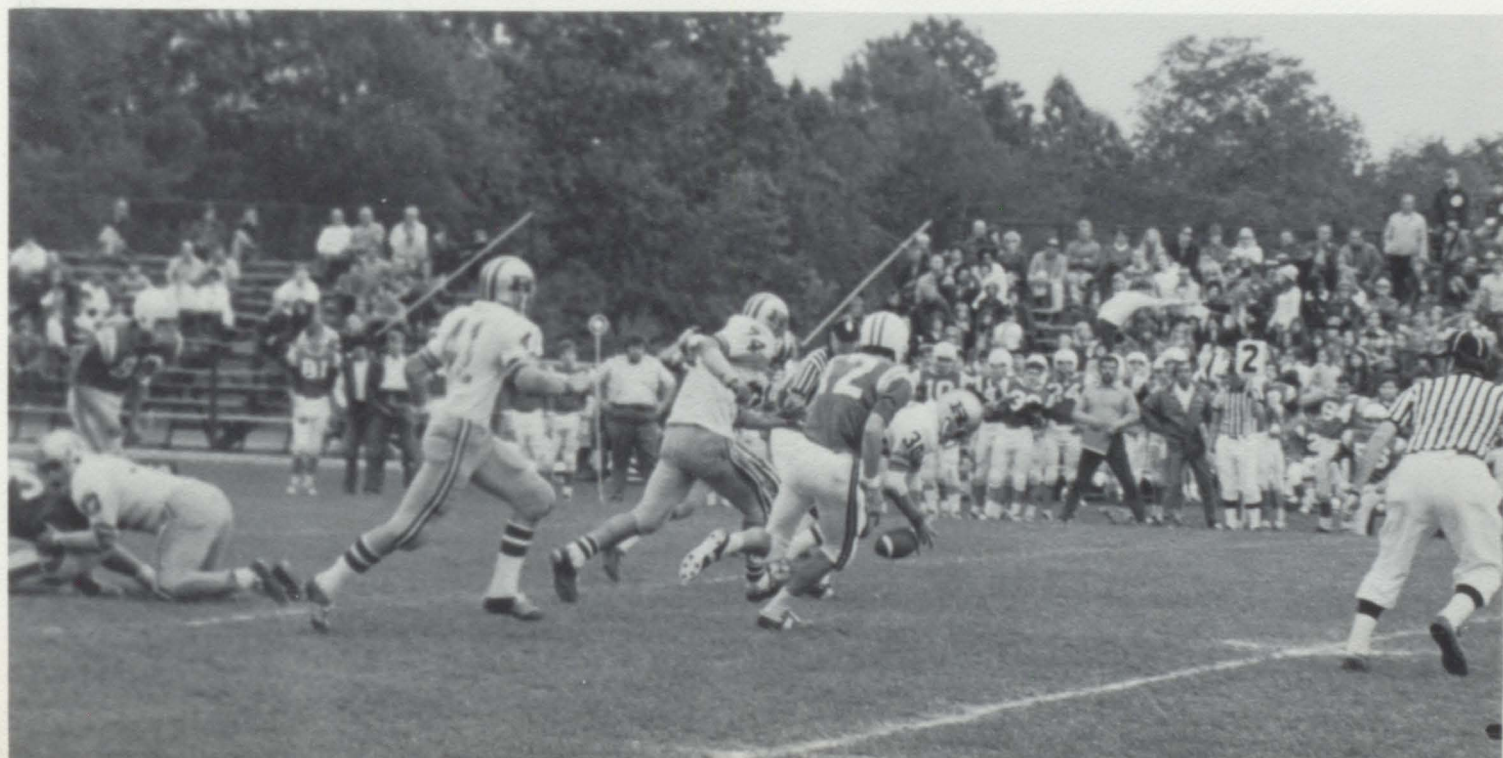

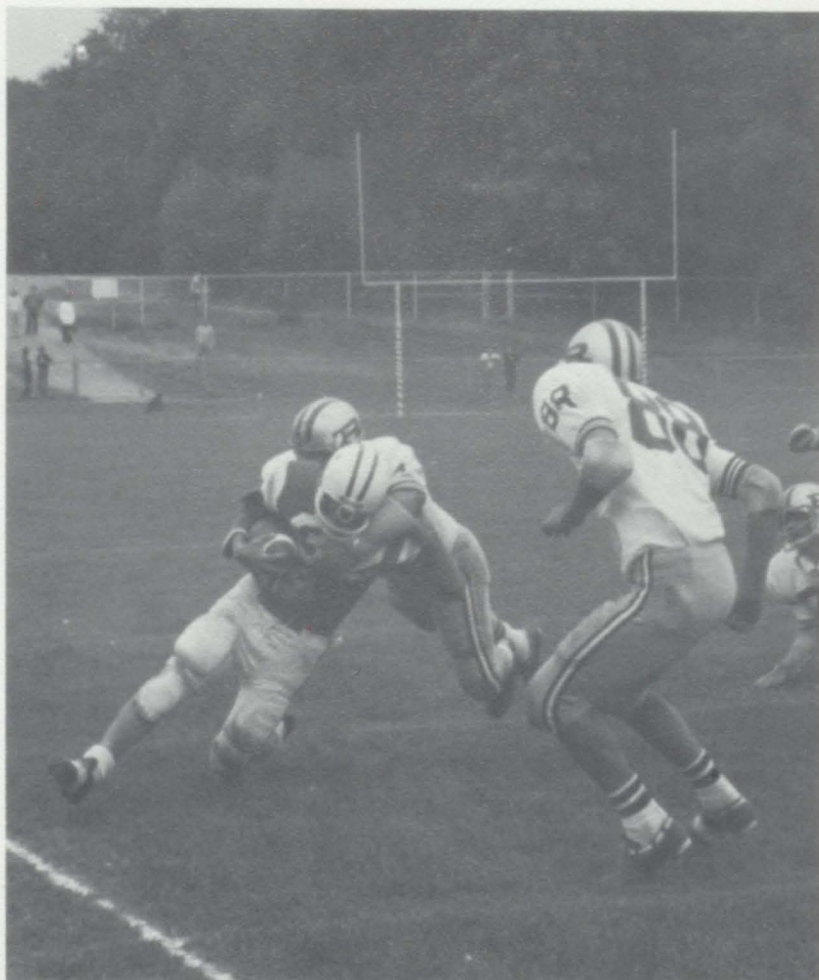

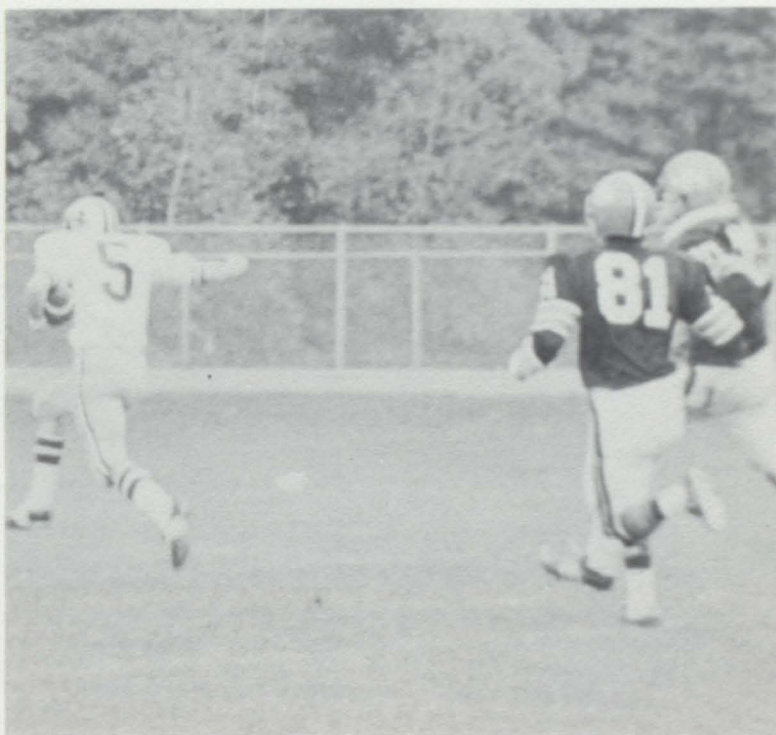

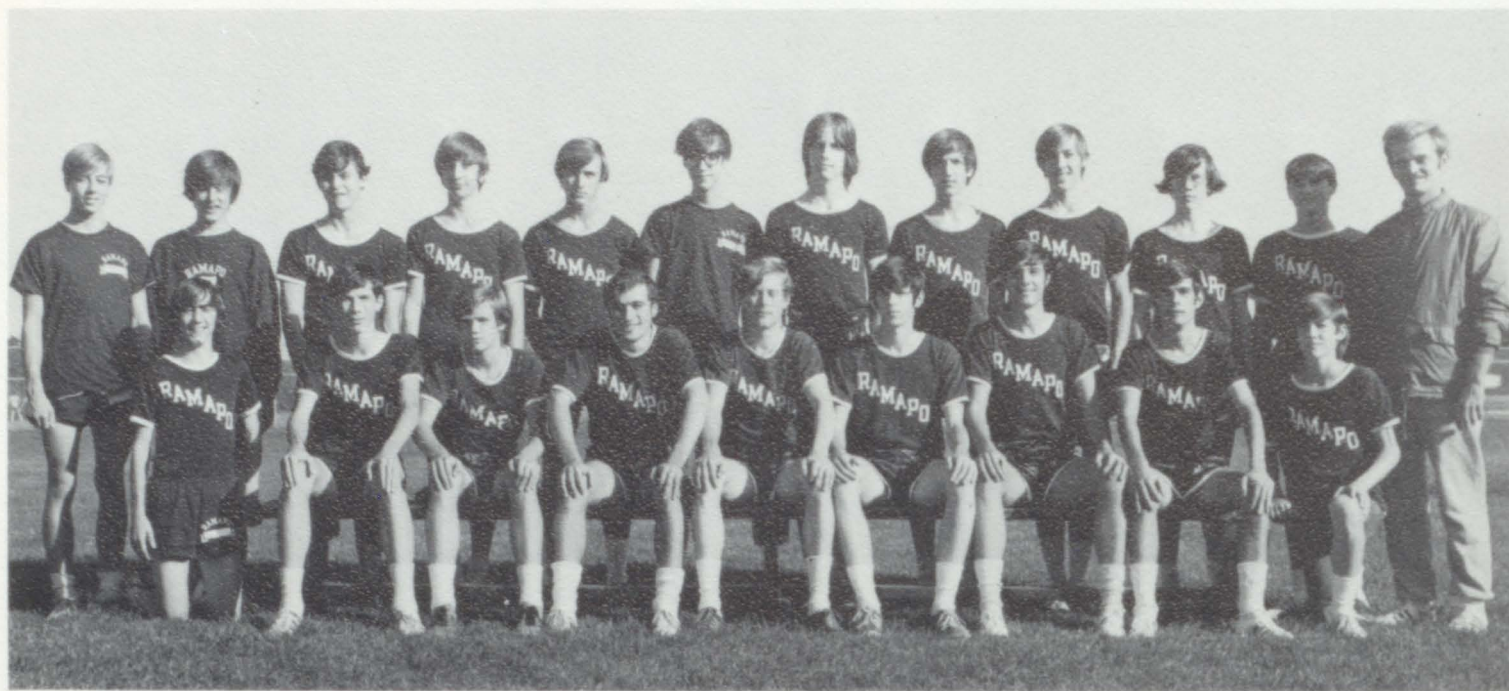

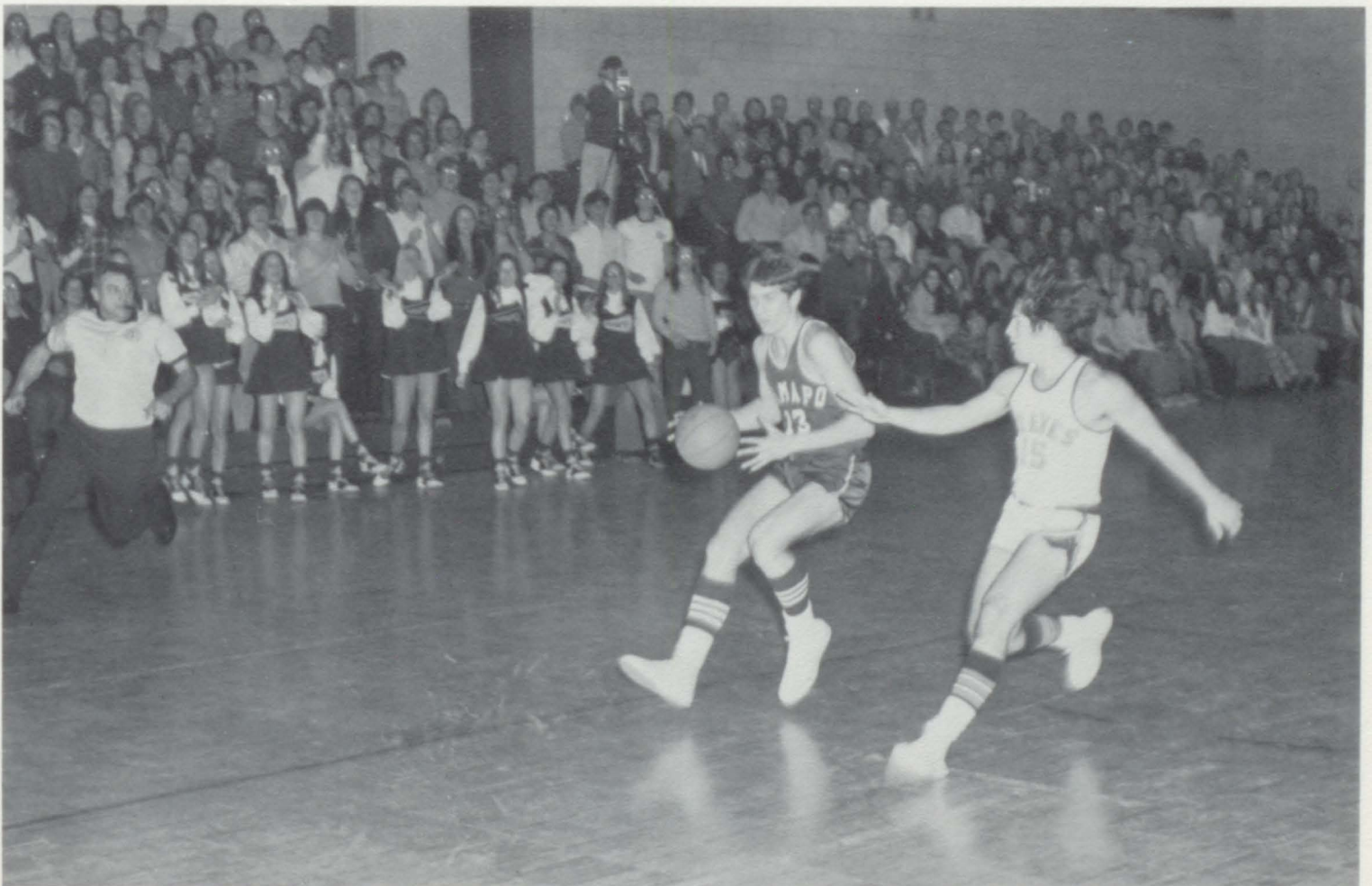

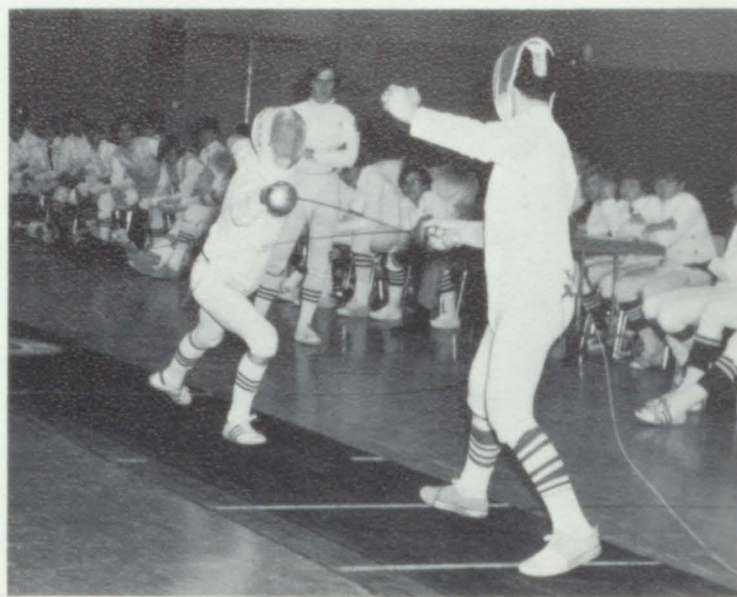

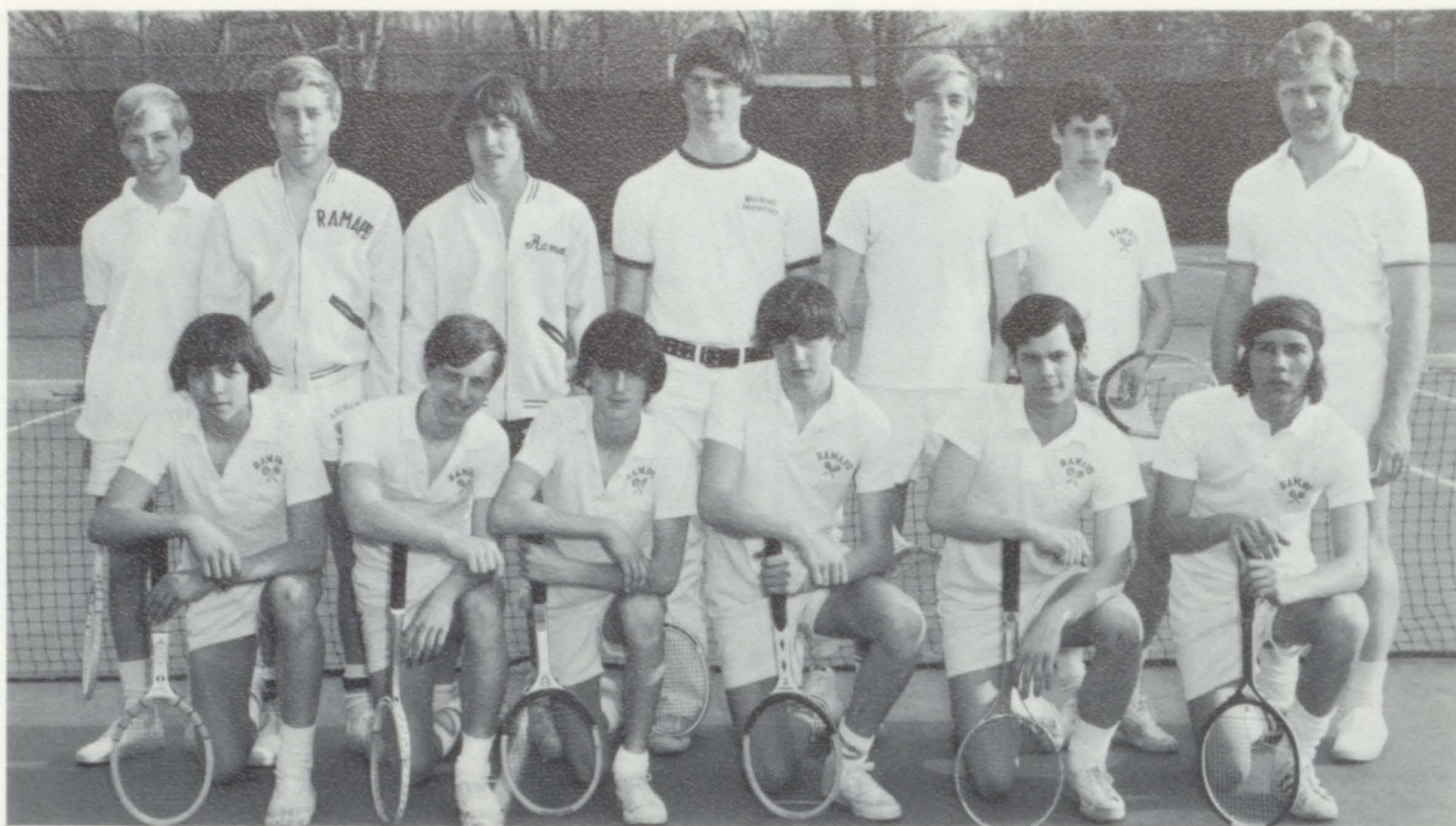

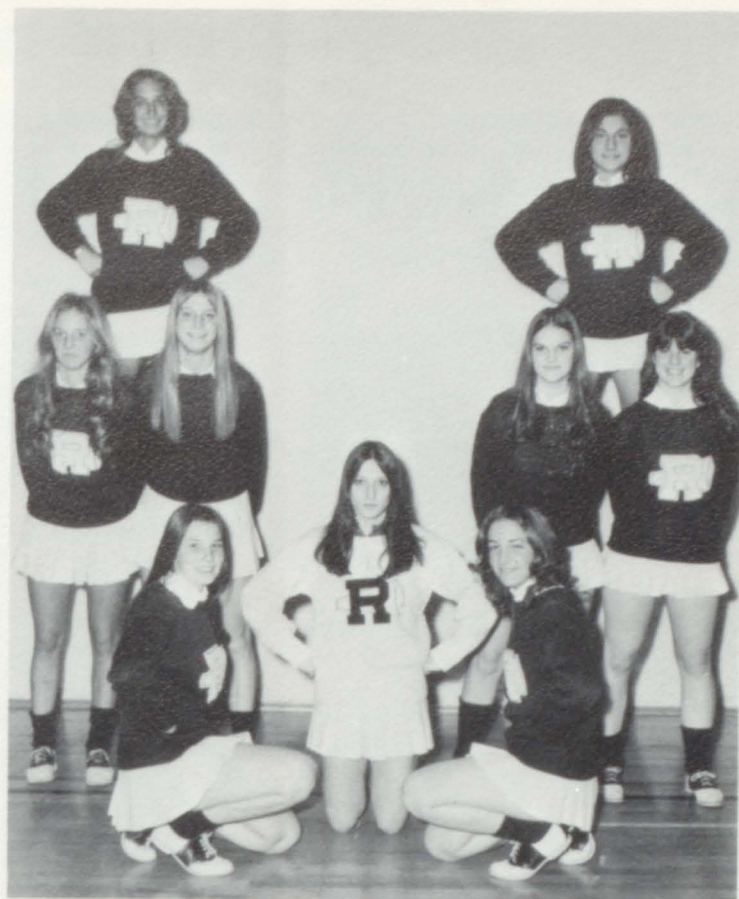

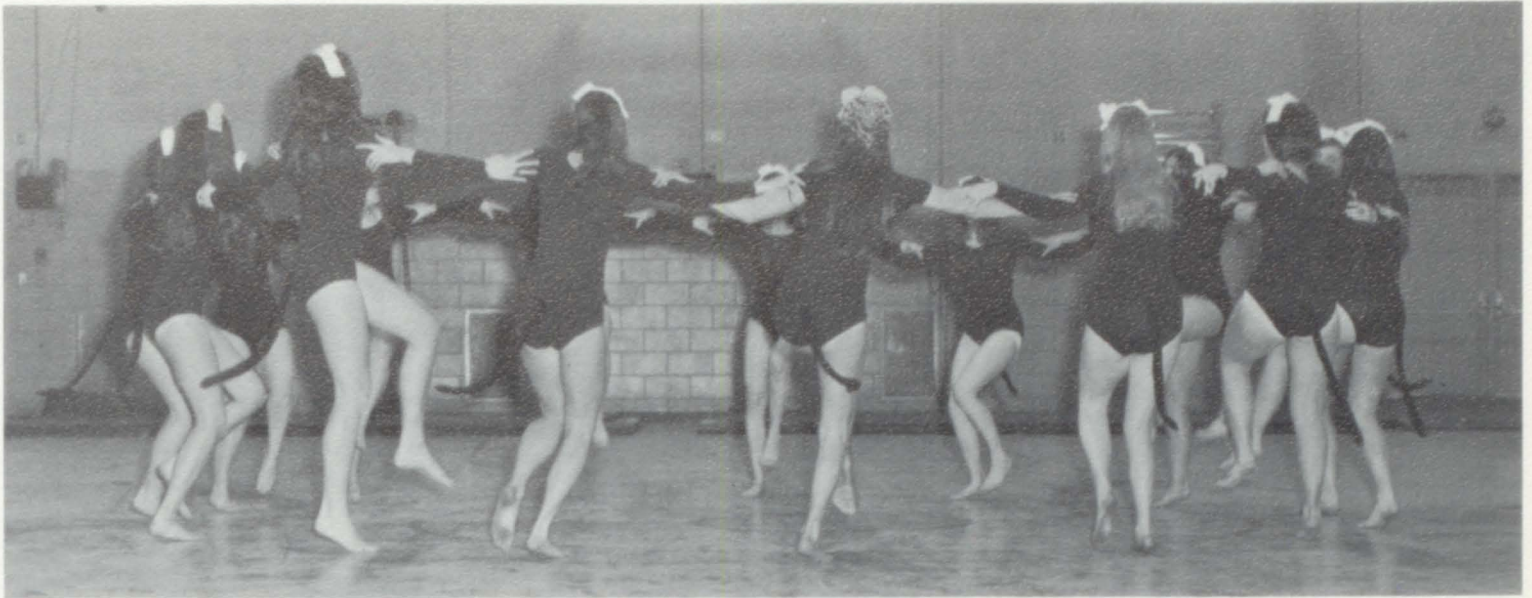
