
After-school activities played a major role in the life of Ramapo. Students had an opportunity to further pursue their interests outside the classroom or just got together for a good time.


These sports and the fencing, bowling, and other winter teams helped provide excitement for both participator and spectator.



Because of this trend, the Guidance counselors spent their Professional Day with a representative from the Department of Labor who spoke on the various types of apprenticeships open to graduates.

They also sponsored a Back-To-School Night to provide parents with an opportunity to meet teachers and become acquainted with courses of study.

New Mini-Courses --- Pioneers, Mystery and Detective Fiction, Myth and Epic Literature, Oral Interpretation

The English Department has expanded the whole concept of their elective program to enable seniors to make their own decisions as to what they would like to study or what they felt they had a need to study. As a result the following courses have been added: Independent Study in Career Education; Mystery and Detective Stories; Myth and Epic Literature; Oral Interpretation and Readers Theatre; and Discussion and Debate. The Speech Arts and Theatre Arts Programs were designed to accommodate the increasing number of students interested in theatrical productions.

Next year the junior program will introduce elective course offerings which have been planned by current English teachers.

The emphasis during the freshman and sophomore years will be on students' achieving competence in the basic skills of writing, speaking, and reading. The reinforcing of basic disciplines of writing and training students to apply these to their own writing is the primary objective of all English teachers.

The New Math plus Smith Fagans add up to a challenging subject


The overall goal of the Mathematics Department is to equip all students who leave Ramapo with an understanding and the skills to serve them in every day life as citizens and taxpayers.

The Mathematics Department offers a complete program of five to five and a half years of math. This year they have been revising both the geometry course through changing sequence and reevaluating essentials and Algebra II course of study which has been reorganized to include a substantial unit in trigonometry.

The advent of the computer has contributed a great deal not only as a teaching aid but as a means of solving problems in statistics. A new course in computer programming has been introduced. At present students have been taught to use the computer in conjunction with other subjects.



The Business Education Department has two main objectives: to provide career training in the business field, enabling students to obtain skills and knowledge for employment after graduation; and to provide business subjects such as personal typing and Consumer Education for non-business students.

The Department also offers senior work experience in the Distributive Education field. Students involved in this program attend regular classes during the morning hours of school and report to an assigned training station in the afternoon. Each student works a minimum of fifteen hours a week, for which he is paid and for which he receives high school credit.

New in the Department this year are four Consumer Education mini-courses: Consumer Finance Market Place, Consumer Finance Management Planning, Law and the Consumer, and Consumer Buying Guide. These personal value courses, which have been very successful, use the multi-media approach instead of traditional textbooks. Audio-visual aides are being used more extensively. Of special interest is the use of video-tapes in simulated interviews.
















Varsity Football ends disappointing season

Old Tappan halfback is brought down from behind by Junior defensive tackle, Fred Depkin (73).







The Raiders closed out their campaign with an overall record of eleven wins, five losses, and three ties. 

Coach Corizzi retires with 3 consecutive NBIL Championships






of Tom Manobianco and Bill McKee took home the trophy for the County Doubles Championship.








